Community Health Needs Implementation Plan

I. Organization Mission

- a. The Mission of Catholic Health Initiatives is to nurture the healing ministry of the church by bringing it new life, energy and viability in the 21st century. Fidelity to the Gospel urges us to emphasize human dignity and social justice as we move toward the creation of healthier communities.

II. Community Served

- a. Our services are delivered primarily to residents in the east end of Umatilla County in Oregon. This includes the Pendleton community (pop. 21,649), and the surrounding areas (pop. 5353). The surrounding areas include the communities of Athena, Adams, Helix, Mission, Meacham, Ukiah, and Pilot Rock. Our primary service area is determined both by proximity of the residents serviced and the fact the majority of these residents come to St. Anthony Hospital for their health care needs.
- b. The majority of the population served are Caucasian (83%), with the remaining population comprised of Native American (9%) and Hispanic (8%) according to the 2010 US Census.

III. Implementation Strategy Process

- a. This implementation strategy was written by Emily Smith, MSN RN – Clinical and Community Educator for St. Anthony Hospital. The strategy was developed in collaboration with the Pendleton Community Health Partnership, which includes representatives from various agencies committed to promoting health and wellness among the people of Pendleton and surrounding areas. This implementation strategy was presented to and approved by the CHI St. Anthony Hospital Executive Board of Directors in November of 2016.

IV. Prioritized List of Significant Health Needs Identified in CHNA

- a. Based on the community health assessment conducted in 2015/16, five key priority areas were identified by members of the Community Health Partnership and other agencies committed to health & wellness. Criterion were based on percentage of the population affected, as well as the severity of the issue at hand.
- b. **The five priority areas identified are:**



- i. Weight Status
- ii. Tobacco/Drug Use
- iii. Mental Health
- iv. Violence/Safety
- v. Chronic Disease Prevention Management

V. Significant Health Needs to be Addressed

a. Violence/Safety

- i. St. Anthony Hospital is committed to reducing violence, especially child abuse, within Umatilla County. As the recipient of a Mission Ministry Fund grant from CHI, St. Anthony Hospital will devote more than \$280,000 over the course of the next three years to implement Positive Parenting Training throughout Pendleton and surrounding areas. It is our hope that this training will reduce the instance of child abuse by 20%. St. Anthony Hospital has teamed with Greater Oregon Behavioral Health, Inc. to hire and maintain a Violence Prevention Coordinator who is dedicated to this effort.

b. Chronic Disease Prevention Management & Weight Status

- i. St. Anthony hospital intends to continue providing Diabetes and Weight Management support groups to reduce instances of Obesity and Diabetes. St. Anthony is also starting a series called Living Well With Chronic Conditions in order to help people live healthier lives. In addition, CHI St. Anthony Hospital intends to continue the Passport to Wellness Health fair annually. Last year, the inaugural event had over 250 community participants who came to learn about how to live healthier lifestyles. These participants were also able to connect with over 60 community entities who participated in the event. It is our hope to increase the number of people attending the health fair by 20% each year. This event is held in collaboration with community partners, such as the County Health Department, Pendleton Fire & Ambulance, Pendleton Parks & Recreation, the American Red Cross, and many others.

VI. Significant Health Needs Not Addressed

a. Mental Health

- i. At this time, CHI St. Anthony Hospital does not have the resources or the personnel required to address mental health in Umatilla County. However, CHI St. Anthony Hospital is committed to collaborating with community entities working to address this need, such as LifeWays



(Greater Oregon Behavioral Health, Inc.) and Blue Mountain Community College's Suicide Prevention Program.

b. Tobacco/Drug Use

- i. At this time, CHI St. Anthony hospital does not have the resources to address Tobacco and drug use. St. Anthony is committed to supporting the efforts of the Umatilla County Public Health Department in their efforts to reduce tobacco and drug use.
